The villages in India are home to .83 billion people comprising 70% of India's population. This reveals the vast human capital of India. The importance of this resource is further strengthened by the fact that India is an agrarian economy. India's villages also house exceptional resources in terms of tangible and intangible property such as traditional knowledge, handicrafts, handlooms, etc.

Rural India did not receive its due attention in the years following independence. However, the beginning of this millennium has seen substantial change on this front. In the past few years, the Government has laid special emphasis on the development of the rural areas alongside urban development and industrial growth. The inclusion of villages in the developmental process will have multi-fold impact such as inclusive development, increase in the farmer's welfare and income, support to secondary industries, etc. The governmental efforts are bearing results but there exists mismatch between the schemes and their intended outreach. The project Gramoday bears in mind this fundamental concern which needs immediate attention to bridge the gap between governmental schemes and the target

audience. Agam as an organisation is involved primarily in facilitating an increase in the outreach of governmental schemes to the marginalised. The project Gramoday is one of the tools to foster this end. Gramoday project uses a bottom-up approach, whereby the children are the agents of change. We plan to establish Rural Knowledge Centres (Gramin Shiksha Kendra) for the purpose of educating the children. Each Centre would be assisted by a Rural Friend (Gram Mitra) who shall be the first point of contact. The Gram Mitra shall not only educate the students enrolled with the Centre but will also be involved in administrative tasks such as assessing the needs of Kendras, identifying the needs of the students, organising events (where and if necessary) for the parents of the students, etc. One of the crucial elements of the Gramoday project is technological intervention in the field of good governance. This will be used foremostly in maintaining transparency in the structure and functioning of the Gramoday project followed by imparting digital literacy to the students and other interested stakeholders.

Small Efforts with Big Impact – Our Hallmark Project:

The villages in India are home to 830 million people, comprising 70% of India's population. This reveals the vast human capital of India residing in villages. The importance of this resource is further strengthened by the fact that India is an agrarian economy. India's villages also house exceptional resources in terms of tangible and intangible property such as traditional knowledge, handicrafts, handlooms etc.



Rural India didn't receive its due attention in the years following independence. However, the beginning of this millennium has seen substantial change on this front. In the past few years, the government has laid special emphasis on the development of the rural areas alongside urban development and industrial growth. The inclusion of villages in the development process will have multiword impact such as inclusive development, increase in farmer's welfare and income, support to secondary industries etc. The governmental efforts are bearing results but there exists a mismatch between the schemes and their intended outreach. The project **Gramodaya** bears in mind this fundamental concern which needs immediate attention to bridge the gap between governmental schemes and the target audience. AGAM as an organisation is involved primarily in facilitating an increase in the outreach of government schemes to the marginalised.

Hallmark Project – Gramodaya



The project **Gramodaya** is one of the tools to foster this end. The **Gramodaya** project uses a bottom-up approach, whereby the children are the agents of change. We have established **Gram Shiksha and Suchana Kendra (GSSK)** for the purpose of educating the children. The **GSSKs** serves as a centre of transformation assisting in providing quality education in subjects such as English, Mathematics, and Computer Science through technological intervention to necessary children.

Each such *Kendra* is being assisted by a **Gram Mitra** who is the first person of contact. The **Gram Mitra** not only educate the students enrolled with the centre but also involved in administrative tasks such as assessing the needs of the *Kendra*, identifying the needs of students, celebrating special days related to Environment, Governance, Independence Day etc., organising events (where and if necessary) for the parents of the students etc.

One of the crucial elements of the **Gramodaya** project is technological intervention in the field of **Good Governance**. This is being used foremostly in maintaining transparency in the structure and functioning of the **Gramodaya** project followed by imparting digital literacy to the students and other interested stakeholders at our **Computer Centre**.

Hallmark Project – Gramodaya

Further, we organise awareness camps on a regular basis not only to make them aware of their citizenry rights but also to inform them about social welfare schemes sponsored by the State and Central Government.

We also organise health camps in villages on a regular basis with an aim not just to provide health services but to create an environment where the whole community gets sensitized about health issues.



A few other initiatives are women empowerment program stressing upon training on operating sewing machines, embroidery, arts, and designing skills as well as tailoring that can assist in their livelihood.

Currently, **Gramodaya** project is being implemented in three villages namely **Babhniyawan**, **Darjipurwan**, in Bahraich district and **Keshwapur Pajawa** in Shravasti district of Uttar Pradesh and we are persistently looking to serve other villages across India under the project.

Gram Shiksha and Suchana Kendra (GSSKs) -

1.) Babhniyawan, Bahraich

It is situated 40 kms away from **Bahraich**, which is both district and sub district headquarters of **Babhniyawan** village. The transport connectivity up to the village is not good. The government bus facility is available only up to **Payagpur** which is about 16 km away from the village. From there people have to have their own vehicle to reach the village. The other way one has to reach Bilaruwa **More** through local tempo/taxi and from there the village is about 3 kms away that has to be covered by bicycle/own vehicles/on foot.

According to the 2011 census of India, Babhniyawan's population is 3450 out of which 1893 people are illiterate which amounts for 54% - the darkest part of the village. Most of the villagers are farmers and totally dependent on their farm products for daily livelihoods.

In the village there is a school facility available only up to class 8 (that too only one primary govt. school till class 5 and one govt. high school till class 8). If one wants to study beyond, he/she has to travel at least 15 kms (to and fro) to go to secondary school.

2.) Darjipurwan, Bahraich

Darjipurwan, is a village about one and a half kms from Babhniyawar. The conditions are almost similar. The literacy is below the national average. The majority of the population are Muslims and are dependent on agriculture. A major percentage of male population migrate to Saudi Arabia for livelihood as labourer, helper etc. The girls are married at an early age as conventionally they are considered to do household works only and education is not considered essential for them. In the village rarely any boy of age more than 15 has continued his studies mostly because they help their family by earning some money by doing some job in some near about city. In the village there is only one primary government school and one Urdu School. Some of the little faces who attend Urdu school don't know how to write their names in hindi/english, they lag behind others who goes to primary school in terms of modern education. The situation is worse for girls. Girls left study even at an early age mainly because of her marriage or traditional reason of not giving much importance to education for girls.

3.) Keshwapur Pajawa, Shravasti

Keshwapur Pajawa village is located in Ikauna Tehsil of Shravasti district in Uttar Pradesh, India. It is situated 33 km away from sub-district headquarter Ikauna and 25 away from district headquarter Bhinga. Keshwapur Pajawa village is also a gram panchayat. The total geographical area of the village is 450.66 hectares.

Keshwapur Pajawa has a total population of 2,501 people. There are about 425 houses in Keshwapur Pajawa village. Bahraich is the nearest town to Keshwapur Pajawa which is approximately 22 km away.

Distribution of Food and Ration for Migrant Workers

AGAM: An Initiative for Good Governance, has been continuously supporting the stranded migrant worker, disabled and homeless person in its limited capacity to sustain them during this lockdown. To quote one instance in Delhi AGAM through its member and volunteer has been able to provide food and ration to 10-12 people (All migrant workers from Bihar) since the announcement of nation-wide lockdown. Our volunteers are also assisting them to get financial aid from the Government of Bihar.

We at AGAM are in its limited capacity constantly striving to help people effected due to COVID-19 and increase awareness among them in terms of sanitation, hygiene and social distancing and also to deter potential wrongdoing of spreading rumours, hoarding of essential items and disobedience of public officer during the lockdown in our fight against COVID-19.

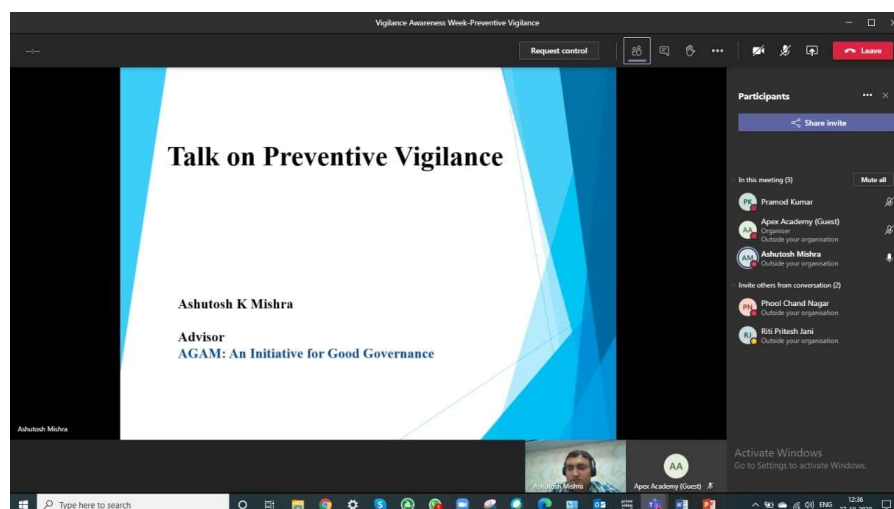
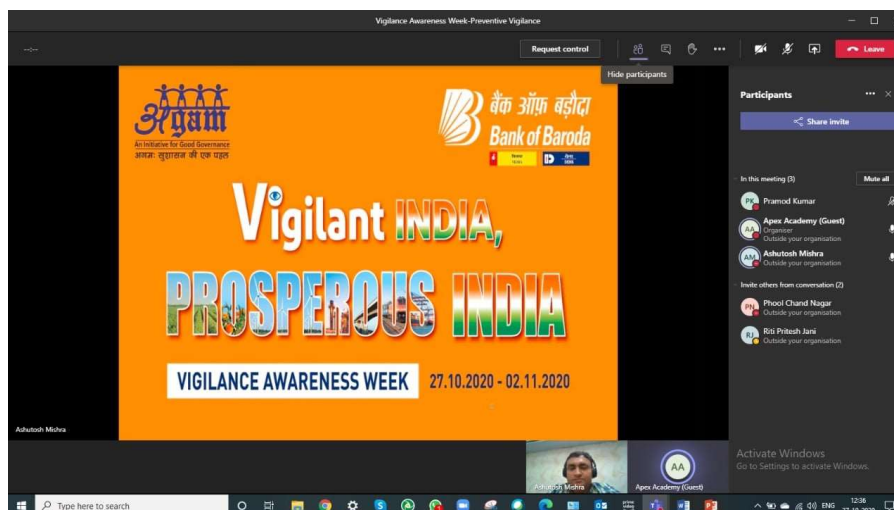
Delivering food for

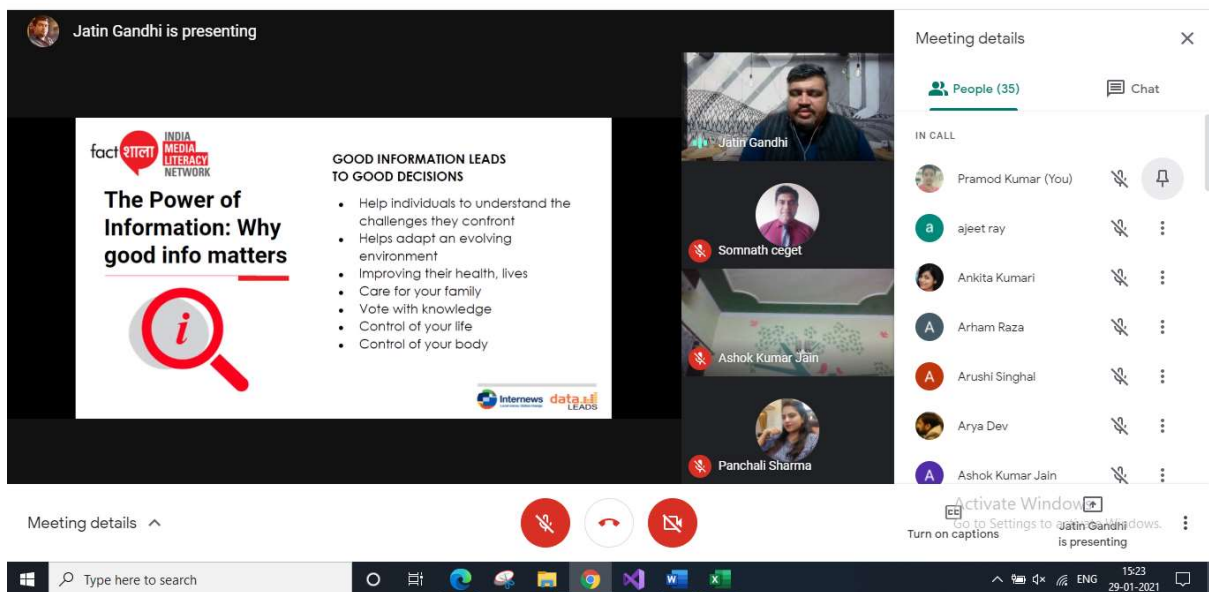
